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


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Adoption and Use of Internet Banking with Special Reference to Select Public and Private Sector Banks

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
ABSTRACT

In the present competitive scenario, banking system is facing challenges with tough competition and advancement of technology. It has become difficult to survive in the service sector in general and banking in particular. It is important for all sector banks to provide quality of services to their target customers to retain and keep them satisfied. The present research attempted to study customer's adoption and usage of Internet banking services. The research was planned with the objective to assess the extent of use and customer's perception towards internet banking services in public and private sector banks. A total of 220 customers from SBI Bank and ICICI Bank in twin cities of Telangana were selected using simple random sampling technique. Responses of customers were analysed with the help of Chi-square test to study the significant difference in usage of Internet banking services. The result of the study clearly shows that the usage of Internet banking services differs according to different sector banks.

MULK RAJ ANAND'S NOVEL UNTOUCHABLE

Mulk Raj Anand, India's most controversial novelist, was born in 1905 in Peshawar now in Pakistan, but then in the North West Frontier Province of India. His father was a Coppersmith who matriculated and rose to the position of the Head Clerk in Dogra Regiment of the British Army. His mother came from a peasant family. They had five sons of whom four survived, the novelist himself being the third.

"Anand's Untouchable deals with the curse of caste system". It starts with the outcastes' colony on the outskirts of the town of Bulasha, close to the cantonment. The outcaste' colony was a group of mudwalled houses that clustered together in two rows, under the shadow of both of the town and the cantonment. There lived the scavengers, the leather-workers, the washermen, the barbers, the water-carriers, the grass-cutters and other outcastes from Hindu society.

Bakha, the main protagonist lives with his father Lakha, his younger brother Rakha, and his young attractive and beautiful sister Sohini, in the dirty colony of Bulashah. He is a young and able-bodied boy of eighteen, and his father is the Jamedar of the sweepers. Their cottage is very small, dark and dank. Bakha's mother died long ago when he was a mere child. The father is old, he does nothing except coughing and abusing his children. He has to work in all weathers, from early in the morning till late in the evening. He has, in addition to it, to endure all humiliation so frequently inflicted on sweepers in the caste-ridden Hindus society.

Bakha is a very sensitive boy. He is uncommon in many ways. While other sweepers like Lakha accepted the caste-realities. Bakha, the representative of the progressive section of the untouchables, simmers with discontent and dreams of social justice. He is full of the spirit of revolt. His mind is preoccupied with his humiliating lot in a caste-ridden, conservative society. The novel gives us an account of his inner anguish. It is a fine. 'stream of consciousness' novel. "This novel technique is used by Anand in *Untouchable* where, like in *Mrs. Dolloway and Ulysses*, the events of the single day in the life of the hero are covered...... The mind of the protagonist moves backward and forward without any limitation of time and space."²

The novel begins with an autumn morning in Bakha's life. He is in bed. It is so early that the sun has yet not risen. He feels much uneasy. Although he is putting on the regulation overcoat, breaches, puttees, and ammunition boots, the biting cold wind reaches right to his skin. He regards the use of quilt as un Sahib like. He has been much influenced by the Tommies (English soldiers) who have always treated him like a human being, and wants to dress like them. In imitating the Tommies' way of life, he has also taken to cigarette smoking. His craze for Angrezi fashion has earned him the nickname Pilpali Sahib. "It is the glamour of the Western culture that Bakha is enamoured of. The racial identity of the 'Whiteman', as contrasted to that of the 'black man' is established at the out set."

While turning in bed with cold, he hears Lakha coughing, and abusing him loudly to get up. He ignores the call for some time. His father's abuses are a routine matter with him. Abuses have only created a growing

Charles Dickens is remembered today as not only one of the greatest novelists of Victorian era but of English literature. He has appealed to all kinds of readers all over the world since his first novel was published in 1836. His works were not limited to certain age group or any section of the society, they were universal. At a same time, the reader finds out that it bears the noticeable signs of present age, influence of past literary traditions and models, of cultural and social influences were noteworthy in his writings. Dickens was the first writer since Shakespeare, to reach such a large audience with such different backgrounds As one critic said about Dickens, "There is no such contemporary writer whose works are read so generally through the whole house, who can give pleasure to the servants as well as the mistress, to the children as well as to the master".

Dickens enjoyed wide and ardent appeal throughout his career; John Forster begin Dickens biography with, "the most popular novelist of the century, and one of the greatest humourists that England has produced." *(Life of Charles Dickens)*. Today, Dickens is the subject of a steady stream of books and thesis in all the scholarly journals. The list of Dickens admirers is full of great literary figures like John Mortimer, John Irving notably- Vladimir Nabokov, who is in the 1950's told his students at Cornwell "if it were possible I would like to devote the fifty minutes of every class meeting to mute mediation, concentration and admiration of Dickens." In the words of Edmund Wilson in 1938 "Dicken's readership has remained huge; discussion of his work had fallen largely to "Doddering 'Dickens-fanciers' bent on proving.

Charles Dickens was born in 1812 to John Dickens and Elizabeth Barrow in a small house on Mile End Terrace in Portsea. His fathers, John Dickens worked as a clerk and mother a normal housewife. Dickens was fifteen months old junior to his sister; and was followed by eight siblings. Sr. Dickens received regular pay raises that should have allow him to manage the family comfortably, but he was never able to manage his finances. In 1821 Sr. Dickens was transferred to Chatham, a following year the whole family moved to Camden Town, London leaving behind the ten old year Dickens to complete his school term. After three months Charles reunited with his family. Charles didn't admire the city. In London, his life changed completely. There was no school to attend because of financial crisis. No one in his family paid attention in educating Charles who was a book lover. Eventually he found solace and comfort in reading books without attending school. He did not escape into books. He started to wonder the streets and lanes of Camden, used to take long walks for hours. His walks gave him a detailed knowledge of the city, which made the novels that he set in London more realistic. Dickens knowledge of London was so thorough that one can get an

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
ABSTRACT



The original name of the Tagore family was Banerjee. Being Brahmins, their ancestors were referred to as 'Thakurmashai' or 'Holy Sir'. During the British rule, this name stuck and they began to be recognised as Thakur and eventually the family name got anglicised to Tagore

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Known mostly for his poetry, Tagore wrote novels, essays, short stories, travelogues, dramas, and thousands of songs. Of Tagore's prose, his short stories are perhaps most highly regarded; he is indeed credited with originating the Bengali-language version of the genre. His works are frequently noted for their rhythmic, optimistic, and lyrical nature. Such stories mostly borrow from deceptively simple subject matter: commoners.
